The meeting was called to order at 8:00 AM. The council recited the pledge of allegiance.

VISITORS

No visitors wished to speak at this time.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

C. Walter made a motion, seconded by M. Richards to approve the minutes from January 20, 2021 and January 21, 2021. The motion was unanimously approved.

APPOINTMENTS/REAPPOINTMENTS

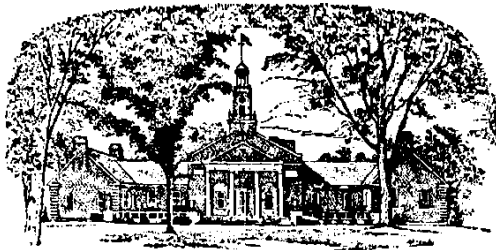
C. Walter made a motion, seconded by M. Richards to appoint Pete Nye (R) to the Board of Education for a term until November 2021. Nye is the republican replacement for O. Francis who recently resigned from his seat. The motion was unanimously approved.

C. Walter made a motion, seconded by T. Guerra and unanimously appointed Arthur Kuever (D) to an alternate seat on the Public Works Commission for a term until June 30, 2021.

T. Guerra made a motion, seconded by M. Richards and unanimously appointed Richard Geer (D) to the Historic District Commission for a term until June 30, 2023, Gary Bango (R) to the Historic District Commission for a term until June 30, 2025 and Laura Reynolds (D) to an alternate seat on the Historic District Commission for a term until June 30, 2023.

M. Richards made a motion, seconded by T. Guerra and unanimously appointed Diane Brennan (R) to the Tree Committee for a term until June 30, 2021.

C. Walter made a motion, seconded T. Guerra and unanimously appointed M. Richards to serve as the Town of Clinton representative on the CT Water Company Advisory Council.



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FIRE DEPARTMENT – AUTHORIZATION TO INSTALL AN UNDERGROUND WATER STORAGE TANK AT THE INTERSECTION OF COW HILL ROAD AND AIRLINE ROAD

Brian Manware, Fire Chief, reviewed the underground water storage tank project with the council. The department completed a water supply study for fire protection and public water. The funding for the underground water tanks were approved with the 2019 bonding package. A local engineer is working with the department and they have identified 3 sites, two of which are on town property and one is on Clinton Land Trust property. The first site is the Little Red School House property. Manware would need authorization from the council to install one of the tanks on town property. M. Richards made a motion, seconded by E. Bergman to authorize the Fire Department to install an underground water storage tank at the intersection of Cow Hill Road and Airline Road. The motion is unanimously approved.

HARBOR GRILL LEASE AGREEMENT

K. Kilduff received a letter from Evan Johnson, lease holder of the Harbor Grill, asking to be released from the third year of his three year contract at the Town Docks. The recommendation would be to release Johnson from his lease agreement and then try and find another vender. M. Richards made a motion, seconded by T. Guerra to release the Clinton Harbor Grill from the third year of their three year lease agreement. The motion was unanimously approved.

ENERGY COMMITTEE

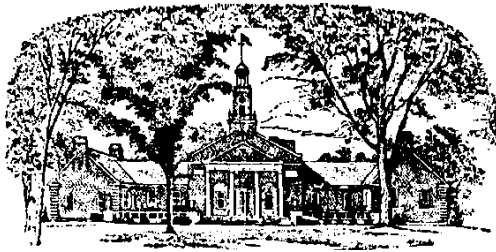
At the last meeting the council was given the Clinton Energy Committee mission statement and list of initiatives. The council received applications from 7 people who would like to be appointed to the committee. E. Bergman made a motion, seconded by T. Guerra to set the membership to the Clinton Energy Committee at 7 people. The motion was unanimously approved. T. Guerra made a motion, seconded by M. Richards to appoint Paul Gebauer, Douglas Astry, Eileen ODonnell, Paul Neri, William Greim, Zachary Plourde and Aidan Moran the Clinton Energy Committee. The motion was unanimously approved.

LAND USE DEPARTMENT LINE ITEM TRANSFER REQUEST

M. Richards made a motion, seconded by T. Guerra to approve a Land Use Department line item transfer request to decrease \$348.00 from training, \$150.00 from general supplies and \$300.98 from other items and increase other professional/technical services by \$798.98. The motion was unanimously approved.

BUDGET CALENDAR

The council was presented with the 2021 budget calendar for their review. The Town Council will have a special meeting on Tuesday, February 9, 2021 at 7:00 PM when the Town Manager along with the Superintendent of Schools will present their proposed budget to the council. Budget workshops will be held on February 18th, 23rd, and 25th at 6:00 PM. The council will finalize the budget on March 2nd at 7:00 pm and send it to a public hearing. The public hearing is scheduled for April 7th at 6:00 pm. Immediately following the public hearing the council will meet to finalize the budget and send it to referendum. As of right now the Annual Budget Meeting is scheduled for May 5th and the Budget Referendum is scheduled



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for May 12th but this could change depending on if the governor extends his executive order. M. Richards made a motion, seconded by T. Guerra to approve the 2021 Budget Calendar as presented. The motion was unanimously approved.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

- Aniskovich thanked Public Works for all of their hard work during this week's snow storm.
- Aniskovich also thanked all of the volunteers who helped seniors 75 years of age and older get signed up to receive their COVID vaccine.
- Aniskovich discussed having a meeting so that the public can better understand how the town council and town manager functions. This will be discussed further at another meeting.

TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

K. Kilduff reviewed his report with the council. A copy of the report is attached to the minutes

- Kilduff updated the council on the status of the grand list and how it relates to the overall budget. The grand list needs to be approved by the assessor at the end of January. The total grand list before the Board of Assessment Appeals acts is projected to increase by 5.7 percent. The Board of Assessment Appeals will make their final recommendations at the beginning of April.

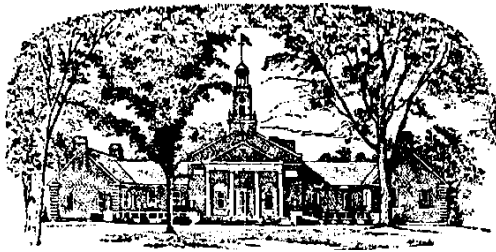

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Clinton Energy Committee

Mission

The mission of the Clinton Energy Committee is to assist the towns residents, businesses and government departments to reduce their energy consumption, increase energy efficiency and the conversion to renewable energy sources.

Climate change is an urgent priority that effects everyone. The Committees goal is to have a meaningful impact locally.

Initiatives

- 1) Benchmark and track energy consumption in all municipal and school buildings. Input all data, gas, oil, water and propane into Energy Star Portfolio Manager. This will help asses energy use and trends to determine which buildings need to be addressed.
- 2) The State of Ct has set a goal of converting to an all electric fleet by 2030.
The town can set a goal of converting to an all EV fleet by 2025.
- 3) Promote and implement energy efficiency programs and opportunities offered by Eversource and the Ct Water Company. Work with Social Services. Many of the programs offered by Eversource are income eligible. Work with the Chamber of Commerce. Small businesses can also benefit from energy efficiency programs.
- 4) Work with the Connecticut Green Bank. The Green Back is a valuable resource for homeowners , multi family homes, apartments, contractors and municipalities to become greener and cleaner.
- 5) Make it a priority to cap the land fill at 117 Old Nod Rd. The land fill has the potential to hold a MW (Mega-Watt) of solar panels and could cut the electric consumption in half. The MW in Westbrook is projected to save the town over \$200,000 annually.
- 6) Develop partnerships with contractors performing the energy efficiency projects. For every job completed a donation will be made to Families Helping Families.

TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

TO: Honorable Town Council Members

FROM: Karl F. Kilduff, Town Manager

DATE: February 3, 2021

Please find my report concerning various items of interest to the Town Council and community.

1. Council Business:

- a) FY21-22 Budget: Meetings have been held with all budget preparing departments and their requests were discussed. Work remains on-going to assemble a proposed budget for the Council to review. A schedule for workshop meetings to review the budget needs to be established by the Council.
- b) Budget Survey: The Town received 158 survey responses to the Budget Preference Survey that was offered online. The majority of responses came in with a Google log-in to insure that there were not multiple submissions from one individual. The Morgan School students started compiling the survey responses for a report to be given.
- c) Grand List: The Grand List which will reflect the change in property values following revaluation was completed by the end of January and signed by the Assessor per state statute. I hope to have more to report on this verbally at our meeting.

2. CCM:

CCM will hold its next Legislative Committee meeting on February 9, 2021.

3. River COG:

The Council of Governments held a virtual meeting on January 27, 2021. Highlights of the meeting which are of interest to Clinton included:

- Transit Integration Study – The COG played a role in the anticipated consolidation of the Estuary Transit District (9 Town Transit) with the Middletown Area Transit (MAT) system. The study laid out the steps required for the merger and anticipated service enhancements that would come from such a consolidation. The study was the starting point for discussions reported further below on a Memorandum of Agreement to bring MAT towns into the Estuary District.
- COVID-19 – Discussions focused on the benchmarking study being done to assess each emergency management region on the region's needs to come back from the pandemic. The process to identify and address unmet needs within a state framework was also discussed.
- Dues – The dues for the COG was approved with essentially no change to Clinton.
- Legislative Update – COG staff discussed the process for submitted testimony on bills before the General Assembly. A list of bills being tracked was also distributed (see attached).

- Natural Hazard Mitigation Plan – The natural Hazard Mitigation Plan was submitted to the State on January 5. Following a review by DEEP staff, the document will be submitted to FEMA for approval. Ultimately, the Plan will come back to Clinton for the Town Council to approve of the Clinton annex to the regional plan. The plan is a tool to position the Town for possible funding to address the risks described in the plan.

4. Estuary Transit Board:

The Transit District Board met on January 28, 2021 with an agenda focused on approving a draft memorandum of agreement (MOA) between the Estuary District, Middletown Area Transit and CTDOT to consolidate the Middletown District into the Estuary. The effort is an important voluntary regionalization that will become a model in the State. The MOA lays out the process between the two transit districts but more importantly delineates the areas where the DOT needs to provide operating and capital support to make the regional effort a success. The Board approved the MOA (which will also be approved by the Middletown Board). The next step in the process is to submit the draft to the DOT. It is expected that another round of negotiations will take place with the DOT to finalize the terms of the agreement and firm up the necessary DOT funding.
