Town Manager's Corner

Back to the Water

The warmth of spring brings us back to the waterfront which gives Clinton much of its character as a community. There is a lot of planned activity in and around the waters of Clinton to report. Most significant is the anticipated dredging of "hot spots" in Clinton Harbor which will keep the harbor open and navigable for boaters. The support of Congressman Courtney helped Clinton secure a spot in the US Army Corps of Engineers' upcoming work plan. Clinton's harbor plays a big role in the Town's "blue economy" and the removal of sediments keeps the harbor's prominence.

As we focus on the importance of the coast as asset, Clinton is part of a regional effort that secured grant funding from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation to develop a regional and local coastal resiliency plan that will help guide future decision making. Clinton staff and volunteer are working with others from Westbrook, Old Saybrook and the Borough of Fenwick on the regional plan. A more specific to Clinton plan will also be part of this effort that will involve a Coastal Resiliency Task Force recently appointed by the Town Council.

The fall and winter months were not kind to the Clinton beach with storms resulting in areas of coastal erosion. The Town has engaged an engineer to help develop potential solutions that will help maintain our coastline. Any solution needs to be coordinated

with both the State Department of Energy and Environmental Protection as well as the US Army Corps of Engineers. We are looking forward to a design solution that will help preserve the Town's coastline which can be permitted by both agencies and be funded utilizing appropriate, available grants and local resources.

Other recent investments that improve our community included, Manufacturing Intern grants were provided to three local manufacturers to hire Clinton high school or returning college students to work in Clinton's manufacturing sector. These businesses offer unique experience opportunities, often times involving high technology. The internship helps local student and gives them a window into a potential local career as well as assists local businesses thrive. The grants were provided from American Recovery Plan Act funds which was provided to the Town. Other small business grants are still available. Application materials can be found on the Town's website. Search for "ARPA Funding" to access applications.



Can I Put a Sandwich Board Sign Out in Front of My Business? Yes, but a Sign Permit is Required


Sandwich Board, or A Frame signs, are often used by restaurants and retailers. They can be used as temporary signs, to advertise a sale or special event, or they can be used on a more permanent basis to help the business gain visibility.

For a permanent Sandwich Board Sign, per Zoning Regulation 34.8.6 Sandwich Board Signs: In non-residential districts, one (1) sandwich board sign, not to exceed six square feet (6 sq. ft.), may be permitted per property. (a) Such sandwich board sign must be located on private property. (b) If the sandwich board sign advertises a use located on a different property, the owner of the property on which the sign is to be located must give permission (via signature on the sign permit application) for the sign to be erected.



For a temporary Sandwich Board Sign, per Zoning Regulation 34.8.5 Temporary Events: Banners, sandwich board signs, or pennants may be permitted for temporary events. A temporary event may include special sales at commercial establishments. (a) There shall be only one (1) temporary sign erected for any event. (b) There shall be no more than two (2) events requiring signage per calendar year except for municipally owned properties where there shall be no more than two (2) signs at a time. (c) The temporary sign may be erected up to two (2) weeks prior to the event and must be removed within one (1) week following the event. (d) No temporary sign may remain for a total of no more than thirty (30) days.

If you'd like either a temporary or permanent Sandwich Board Sign, you are required to obtain a Sign Permit. You can apply for the permit online through the Land Use Office. Please contact us with any questions. We're here to help.



Clamming

Your Shellfish Commission collects samples each month and after every major rain event. The water samples and clam samples are tested at State labs. The labs assure the shellfish beds are safe for harvest. Documentation of high water quality and clam health has allowed the State to permit Clinton shellfish beds to be open all year

Clamming traditions

Native Americans clammed for millennia. New Englanders clammed for centuries. Clams are a traditional part of a coastal New England diet

Where to find clams

Each town along the shoreline has designated recreational beds. Clinton beds are south of the town beach and east of the harbor channel. The Shellfish Commission seeds and stocks clams in this area.

Clams live under the sand or mud and hide in the tidal areas. They don't move much but do get moved with the shifting sands.

Delicious and nutritional food • Great exercise • Year-round outdoor activity • Fresh air and beautiful sunsets • Family fun activity • License fees go to stocking and seeding clams - more clams mean healthier and cleaner waters

Why do clams hide?

Clams are not just eaten by us. They have many predators looking for them: Crabs, seagulls, starfish, worms even some fish. By staying out of sight, they improve their chances of survival and grow and reproduce.

Because clams are filter feeders, they must circulate water through their shells to extract what they need from the water that flows by above them. Hardshell clams have a tube about 1 1/2" long that is part of their anatomy. They extend the tube up to the surface of the sand and draw water down into their shells extracting oxygen and nutrients from the water.

Clammers know this; and therefore, know the clams they seek are resting invisibly just an inch or two below the surface of the sandy bottom. Clam rakes are designed to find them.

Things you need to go clamming

- A clamming license - all shellfish beds are controlled by the State and



managed by each town along the shore. The licenses are sold by each town and each town sets the regulations for their shellfish beds. Maps and a sheet of regulations are provided when you buy your license and are also available on line. Licenses are affordable and entitle one adult and a companion to clam together. Children 12 and under can clam without a license.

- You will need a rake and a basket. The clam rake is designed to reach down into the sandy bottom and detect and collect the clams. The basket is to help you to carry your harvest home.

Probate Fees 101

The Probate Court becomes involved when a person dies in order to assist with transferring assets from the name of the deceased person to his or her heirs or beneficiaries under a Will. In our court, which serves a population of approximately 62,000, we saw a rise in decedent's estate matters with the onset of the Covid pandemic, moving from 1,419 decedent's estates in 2019 to 1,523 in 2020 and eventually 2,371 in 2021. There is much information and misinformation about what the cost is to invoke the assistance of the Probate Court in a decedent's estate matter. Calculating probate fees is very fact specific, but it is my hope that the guidelines below will assist court users in understanding how fees might be assessed for their own estates.

For anyone dying on or after July 1, 2016, probate fees are assessed in accordance with the following table:

Basis for Computation of Fees	Total Fee
0 to \$500	\$25
\$501 to \$1,000	\$50
\$1,000 to \$10,000	\$50, plus 1% of all in excess of \$1,000
\$10,000 to \$500,000	\$150, plus .35% of all in excess of \$10,000
\$500,000 to \$2,000,000	\$1,865, plus .25% of all in excess of \$500,000
\$2,000,000 to \$8,877,000	\$5,615, plus .5% of all in excess of \$2,000,000
\$8,877,000 and over	\$40,000

Any portion of the basis for fees that passes to the surviving spouse is reduced by fifty per cent.

In a hypothetical scenario where the husband of a couple dies first, and the couple owns a house valued at \$500,000, a joint bank account valued at \$100,000, a jointly owned car valued at \$20,000, and the husband has a retirement account valued at \$350,000, all of which pass to his surviving spouse, the probate fee would be calculated as follows: half of the value of the jointly owned assets are attributed to the husband's estate, namely house, bank account and car, or $(\$250,000 + \$50,000 + \$10,000 = \$310,000)$. The retirement account is solely owned, so its entire value of \$350,000 is added to the \$310,000 in joint assets = \$660,000.

Since all property passes to the surviving spouse, the \$660,000 in value of the husband's assets is reduced by half, and becomes \$330,000. Using the table above, the probate fee is then calculated as follows: $(\$330,000 - \$10,000) * 0.0035 = \$1,120.00 + \$150.00 = \$1,270.00$

Further information about fees associated with decedent's estates can be found in the Connecticut General Statutes, section 45a-107, and online at www.ctprobate.gov/pages/probate-fees-and-expenses. The online calculator is useful, but calculating probate fees is most accurately done by a skilled probate clerk at your local court. The Saybrook District Court serves the 9 towns of Chester, Clinton, Deep River, Essex, Haddam, Killingworth, Lyme, Old Saybrook and Westbrook.

From the Tax Collector

Taxes will be due July 1, 2023

The first installment of town tax for real estate and personal property taxes and motor vehicle will be due on Friday July 1, 2023, we close at 12:00 noon on Fridays.

The last day to pay your taxes without penalty is August 1, 2023 at 4 pm. If you mail your payment on the last day, it MUST BE POSTMARKED 8/1/23. Interest accrues at 1.5% per month, 18% per annum. On August 2, 2023 your tax balance will be charged 3%.

We do not send out new bills for your second Installments for Real Estate and Personal Property which will be due January 1, 2024 and delinquent on February 1, 2024.

PAYMENT OPTIONS:

The top portion of the bill is your receipt, along with your canceled check. You will also be able to use the online system to view your payments and print reports, if you have trouble navigating the online system, give our office a call during office hours, and we will be glad to walk you through the process. 860-669-9067.

Online Payments: www.clintonct.org. If you use the online payment option, please remember the fees associated with its usage. The online system defaults to credit card payments which carry a fee of 2.99%, you can change that to Electronic Check and put in your routing number and account number for a flat .95 cents. REAL ESTATE:

You will receive a bill with 3 coupons. "A" is for your July installment, "B" is for your January 2024 installment and "C" is your receipt. If you'd like a receipt, please bring the "C" coupon with you. If you send by mail, please include a self-addressed stamped envelope.

MOTOR VEHICLES:

Sold, lost, stolen, traded your vehicle? Please contact the Assessor's Office to give them proper documentation to correct your bill, they can be reached at 860-669-9269.

Moving into Connecticut from out of state:

Once you have established residency in Connecticut, you have 30 days to transfer your out-of-state license to Connecticut. You have 60 days to transfer your vehicle registration(s) to this state.

Clinton Historic District Commission

The Clinton Historic District Commission's Program for Recognition of an Historic Property's Restoration, recognizes its second Honorable Mention of a property whose restoration used modern exterior materials, such as vinyl siding, rather than materials common to the era when the structure was originally built. As with

HDC's first honorable mention, in this case, there will be recognition in the press, though no photo hung on a wall at Andrews Memorial Town Hall. We are hoping that such public recognition will encourage more people to repair and restore their antique properties. HDC's second honorable mention goes to Three Eleven LLC for their restoration of the house at 138 East Main Street, originally built in 1820, which is a contributing structure in the Clinton Village Historic District.

This house had an interesting and public history under previous ownership. The building housed a number of businesses, one of which was cited by the Town of Clinton's Zoning Enforcement Officer for excess signage. Claiming that their customers could not find them under the town's signage regulations, they

fought to keep what excess signage they had in place – but lost. And so they painted each face of the building's exterior, including its annex, a different, bright color. Red, green, blue, yellow, purple — as there was, and still is, no regulation about the color the exterior of a structure in Clinton can be painted — even in a National Register District. The fracas and the building owner's ultimate solution caught the eye of the press and a feature story ended up on page one of the New York Times Sunday/Connecticut Real Estate Section. The building now houses apartments, not businesses, and the siding, though vinyl, is a lovely, uniform shade of light gray. The property, now fully restored, looks as glorious as it must have when first built a little over two hundred years ago.


